### A Case for Love documentary screenings June 23, 2:30 and 7 p.m. ET

Two free screenings of the feature-length documentary "A Case for Love"—which was inspired by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry's message of love—will be offered at the Moritz von Bomhard Theater, 501 West Main St. in Louisville, Kentucky, at 2:30 and 7 p.m. Sunday, June 23.

The screenings are offered in celebration of Presiding Bishop Michael Curry's ministry and the film's Episcopal roots, with sponsorship support from Bishop Andy Doyle and the Episcopal Diocese of Texas and Bishop Larry Provenzano and the Episcopal Diocese of Long Island.

Filmmakers will be there to respond to questions and provide sample discussion guides for adults and youth in advance of the film's scheduled digital release this fall.

#### The History of Policing in Louisville: June 17 @6:30 pm

You are invited to an upcoming presentation and discussion on The History of Policing in Louisville: A Fact-Finding Report on Institutional Harms.

As part of the Truth and Transformation process brought to Louisville by CLOUT, the Metro Government agreed to commission research into the history of policing in Louisville. A team of researchers from the University of Louisville completed the study in January 2024 and concluded that recent cases of abuse and racial discrimination in policing are part of a larger pattern dating back to the founding of the city in the 18th century.

Learn more about this important history and hear the perspectives of two of the researchers, Dr. Catherine Fosl and Dr. Felicia Jamison, on Monday, June 17 at 6:30 pm at Grace Hope Presbyterian Church (702 E Breckinridge St).

The Rev. Dr. Angela Johnson, pastor, and Rabbi Emeritus Bob Slosberg, co-chair CLOUT's Community Safety & Equity issue committee. CLOUT brought the \$385,000 four-part Truth and Transformation process to Louisville to repair police-community relations. This is one of only two parts of the process that were completed before the contract expired. All are invited to learn the backstory and to ask questions.

## Justice Celebration

CLOUT members and supporters converged at Congregation Adath Jeshurun on June 3. Guest speakers brought hope and encouragement. AJ welcomed us with a delightful kosher dessert buffet. First, Paul Callanan, Director of the Office of Safe and Healthy Neighborhoods, reported a 35% decrease in gun violence in every neighborhood since his office and CLOUT formed the Louisville Alliance for Sustainable Gun Violence Reduction. The Alliance has brought together 300 individuals and groups working on the problem. They are beginning to collaborate with one another. Christie McCravy, Executive Director of the Louisville Affordable Housing Trust Fund, reported that, although 5,000 units of Affordable Housing for those at the AMI level of \$29,000 income for a family of four have been built, 36,000 additional units are needed. CLOUT was instrumental in founding the Trust Fund in 2015, succeeded in securing \$100 million for it from Metro Council last year, and received the first "Champion of Affordable Housing" award. An ongoing barrier to multifamily affordable housing is NIMBYism.

CLOUT's Investment Drive is well on its way. CCC has pledges for \$8200 of our \$10,000 goal but needs help from a few more faithful supporters of justice for all. Grateful thanks to our investors!

## Visit "God at 'I' Level" Art Exhibit during GC



sometimes forget that behind every issue is a person we can get to know and honor and love. That God is at eye level.

"Ansel Adams once said that a good photograph is 'knowing where to stand.' While this is often interpreted as finding the perfect geographic location to capture light, I choose to make it political. Fitting my contemporary work into the history of photography, 'knowing where to stand' becomes a statement of conviction in our contemporary society. We need to live a life



Episcopal Migration Ministries. The exhibit will be available throughout the convention.

Since 2016, Asher Imtiaz has been telling stories of recent immigrants to the United States, mainly refugees and asylum seekers, through photography. This calling has only become clearer against the backdrop of anti-immigration rhetoric and the politics of fear. "The only way to combat 'the other' mentality is to share stories," says Imtiaz. "Immigration has been a major divisive issue among Americans in the last few years and has created fear among many. We of sustained attention. And awareness should move toward responsibility and action."

"God at 'I' Level" takes similar themes and subjects and focuses specifically on confronting the all-powerful "I" in individualistic culture, engaging human eyes to get beyond the alienating self-absorption that leads to unjust attitudes and practices: "God is looking back at us. God is at eye level. Looking in human eyes is an opportunity to love God. Christians in the U.S. need this reminder—especially when some leaders say and do things that are dehumanizing."
