SECOND READING Romans 8:14-19, 34-35, 37-39



Lord, have mercy.





We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. Therefore, according to his command, O Father,


We remember his death, We proclaim his resurrection, We await his coming in glory;






Invitation to Communion





POSTLUDE Jesus Christ, My Sure Defense

The liturgy for the dead is an Easter liturgy. It finds all meaning in the resurrection. Because Jesus was raised from the dead, we too shall be raised.

The liturgy, therefore, is characterized by joy, in the certainty that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities,

nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord."

This joy, however, does not make human grief unchristian. The very love we have for each other in Christ brings deep sorrow when we are parted by death. Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend. So, while we rejoice that one we love has entered into the nearer presence of our Lord, we sorrow in sympathy with those who mourn.

Ronnah Lynn (neé Childress) Bogert

died on January 24, 2024 in Louisville, Kentucky, surrounded by her family. She was 69 years old. Born to Buddy and Fonzole Childress, Ronnah grew up around the deep south before moving to Bowling Green at the age of eight. A proud Hilltopper, she graduated from Bowling Green High School and Western Kentucky University, after which she moved to Louisville. There she met her husband, Christopher Bogert, who she married in 1981. Ronnah-affectionaly known as Cricket to her church family—loved many things, but most of all she loved her children and her grandchildren. Ronnah was, at heart, a teacher. She worked for Jefferson County Public Schools at Cane Run Elementary and Shelby Elementary. She also served for many years as the Christian Education director at St. Peter's Episcopal Church. She is preceded in death by her parents and her husband, Christopher, and is survived by her children (Hilary, Erin, and Nathan) as well as her grandchildren (Blaine, Luke, and Owen). The funeral will take place on Sunday, January 28 at 3 PM at Christ Church Cathedral.
