Led by the Spirit, Simeon and Anna came to the temple, recognized the child as the Christ, and proclaimed him with joy. United by the same Spirit, we now enter the house of God, where we shall recognize Christ in the breaking of bread.

And let our cry come to you. The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Gospel Luke 2:22-40

The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ, according to Luke.

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, the parents of Jesus brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, "Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord"), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons."

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man

was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

"Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;

for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,

a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel."

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, "This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too."

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband seven

The Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, Lord Christ.** years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshiped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:


Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.





The Blessing of Throats

- traditionally, this blessing for health is given on February 3, the feast of Saint Blaise, Bishop and Martyr—however, it may be given as desired at any time during the year, and in any place
- placing the two candles in the form of a cross, the celebrant applies them to the throats of those who desire the blessing, saying:

Through the intercession of blessed Blaise, may God free you from all illness of the throat, and from all other ailments: In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.



Saint Blaise, the martyred Bishop of Sebaste in Armenia, was also a skilled physician. Tradition tells us that on his way to martyrdom he healed a child who was choking to death. While the blessing is given to the throat in memory of his charitable act, it is also a blessing for bodily health in general.
