Where did the placards go?

Over the past 18 months, Christ Church Cathedral has been bearing witness to epidemic of mass shootings in the United States. Together, we prayed and placed placards on the walls of this sacred space for each of the 656 mass shootings which occurred during 2023. This past week, volunteers removed the placards in preparation for the conclusion of this act of prayer and witness. During General Convention, each Deputation will be presented with the placards commemorating the mass shootings which took place in their diocese as a visible sign of the prayers we have been lifting up on their behalf.

This does not mark the end to our parish's witness to the scourge of gun violence, but a transition. Over the summer months, we encourage everyone in the congregation to be in prayer for our way forward. Please bring anything which the Spirit puts on your heart to the Dean, a member of the Chapter, or a ministry chair. With God's help, we will discern how we are called by God, both individually and communally, to serve the Prince of Peace and end gun violence in our community.


Visit "God at 'I' Level" Art Exhibit during GC

You are invited to the opening of an art exhibit and artist's talk called "God at 'I' Level" at the Cathedral during the General Convention from 7:30 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, June 25, for a time of learning together. The event is free and open to the public.

The opening event is sponsored by The Living Church, Christ Church Cathedral, and the Episcopal Parish Network to celebrate a new exhibit by photographer Asher Imtiaz. Many photos in this exhibit were taken with the help of By Amber Noel, The Living Church

"Ansel Adams once said that a good photograph is 'knowing where to stand.' While this is often interpreted as finding the perfect geographic location to capture light, I choose to make it political. Fitting my contemporary work into the history of photography, 'knowing where to stand' becomes a statement of conviction in our contemporary society. We need to live a life

Since 2016, Asher Imtiaz has been telling stories of recent immigrants to the United States, mainly refugees and asylum seekers, through photography. This calling has only become clearer against the backdrop of anti-immigration rhetoric and the politics of fear. "The only way to combat 'the other' mentality is to share stories," says Imtiaz. "Immigration has been a major divisive issue among Americans in the last few years and has created fear among many. We of sustained attention. And awareness should move toward responsibility and action."

"God at 'I' Level" takes similar themes and subjects and focuses specifically on confronting the all-powerful "I" in individualistic culture, engaging human eyes to get beyond the alienating self-absorption that leads to unjust attitudes and practices: "God is looking back at us. God is at eye level. Looking in human eyes is an opportunity to love God. Christians in the U.S. need this reminder—especially when some leaders say and do things that are dehumanizing."
