## **First Reading** Genesis 3:8-15

#### Gospel Mark 3:20-35

The Holy Gospel of our Savior, Jesus Christ, according to Mark. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

The crowd came together again, so that Jesus and his disciples could not even eat. When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, "He has gone out of his mind." And the scribes who came down from Jerusalem said, "He has Beelzebul, and by the ruler of the demons he casts out demons." And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables, "How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come. 



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## **Christ Church Cathedral Land Acknowledgement**

Christ Church Cathedral of the Episcopal Diocese of Kentucky gathers and stands on land which has been home, for over 11,000 years, to primarily Shawnee, Cherokee, Osage, Haudenosaunee Seneca, Hopewell and Adena peoples. Today we acknowledge the role our Church has played in colonialism's devasting legacy of death, stolen lands, dehumanizing removals, and forced assimilation of native people. We repent of our complicity in perpetuating the dominance of white European culture, even to the present day. We seek forgiveness. We honor the original peoples of this land and the presence of native people still living in Kentucky. We honor with respect their Elders, past, present, and future, their traditions, and the land itself. We commit to listen, learn, and walk in love.

## The Very Rev. Dr. Robert Willis DL KStJ, Dean Emeritus of Canterbury

Robert Willis is a priest in the Church of England and is known for being a theologian, hymn-writer and pastor. He served as Dean of Canterbury, running the mother church of the Anglican Communion and the King's School, Canterbury, (the world's oldest school, founded by St Augustine in 597) and advising three archbishops, government and the crown from 2001 to 2022.

During this time he raised the sums needed to undertake and complete the most



extensive restoration of the cathedral's buildings – a complex which covers 28 acres in the centre of the ancient city of Canterbury, these "precincts"

are a sacred, holy space for people to escape from the pressures of the outside world and feel something of the spiritual heritage which dates back over 1400 years; he oversaw the care of its skilled workforce and volunteers who numbered, including the school, nearly 1500 people, and a undertook a huge outreach which incorporated not just the diocese but the local population as a whole.

He was daily involved in the running of the school and oversaw its own expansion and the addition of 5 further schools including two for the under-served communities in the county, an international school and a school in China and one in Cambodia – all of which have the ethos of social justice, public service and of breaking down boundaries, be they social or cultural or otherwise.

Reconciliation and bridge-building have been the hallmark of Dean Robert's ministry and in Canterbury he used the hotel and conference centre which he built to host groups, including bishops and seminarians from the Anglican Communion, to bring people closer together.

Prior to Canterbury he spent nine years as Dean of Hereford (where he undertook extensive renovations, saved the Mappa Mundi from being sold off and the Chain Library and secured the finances to safeguard both) and before that similar works for five years as Vicar of Sherborne Abbey.

A leading member of the General Synod for over thirty years and with oversight of the Deans' and Provosts' council of England for two decades, he has also worked on numerous regional, national and international boards – including in the US, Canada, China, Eastern Africa, New Zealand... – of charities and associations ranging from the arts and music to homelessness and healthcare.

He is most recently well-known for the broadcasts of Morning Prayer that he and his civil-partner of 22 years, Fletcher Banner, made every day for 26 months during the COVID-19 pandemic which attracted and still attracts millions of views from all over the world of people of all faiths and none (www.youtube.com/@GardenCongregation), helping people through those dark years

and bringing many back to faith whilst showcasing the beautiful gardens both of the Cathedral and the Deanery which Fletcher had spent many years improving and enhancing to improve their beauty and use but also their biodiversity – conservation and wildlife are close to their hearts and have resulted in Dean Robert being nicknamed "the Green Dean" by many.

The Deanery was opened up to various programmes through the year run by Fletcher and, though being their private home and the gift of the crown (deans of medieval cathedrals are employed by the crown and sit outside of the church and at the same level as the (arch)bishops) – they received over 25,000 visitors through the house and gardens each year – in addition to managing the 1.5 million visitors to the cathedral each year.

Dean Robert has received doctorates from various universities, including Yale, a deputy lieutenancy and the rare Freedom of the City of Canterbury in recognition for his work for the people of the city and the wider county of Kent, the Cross of St Augustine from Archbishop Rowan Williams and the gift of a relic of St Gregory the Great from His Holiness in recognition and thanks for his work in ecumenism and reconciliation.

On January 23, 2023 he was named Dean Emeritus of Canterbury by Archbishop

Justin Welby and since then both he and Fletcher have been working as ambassadors for the church and various charities all over the world, most especially the Episcopal church in the US – with which they have worked for the past two decades – as well as the Church of Canada and the Reformed Episcopal Church of Spain. After more than 40 years as chair of major boarding schools and sitting in senior roles in various universities as well as being a Fellow of the Royal School of Church Music and Sub Dean (and Knight) of the Order of St John nationally with its vital work in training cadets in healthcare, education is very important to Dean Robert and he still represents various organisations both in the UK and overseas. A keen musician and writer he is currently working on various commissions and as a keen supporter of the arts and architecture, having spent decades on national advisory boards and having been awarded fellowships in both disciplines, he is also frequently called upon to judge and adjudicate on different artistic and building projects, as he is also to banks and blue chip companies due to his experience of working on various ethics boards.

He and Fletcher are still running the daily ministry of the Garden Congregation which they started in 2020 and which has brough them so much joy as they meet hundreds of new people each week, both virtually and in person.
