



It is my pleasure to welcome you to Christ Church Episcopal Cathedral for this evening of Advent Lessons and Carols. Founded on May 31, 1822 in what was then a western frontier town, this historic cathedral stands as the oldest house of worship in Louisville. The original structure was completed in 1824. As the Cathedral we are the seat of the Bishop of Kentucky and a resource to its congregations. Christ Church Cathedral embodies Christ by serving our neighbor so that we share together in the power of God's unconditional love.

The Service of Lessons and Carols tells the story of the fall of humanity and the promise of the Messiah as told in seven short Bible readings, interspersed with the singing of carols and hymns.

We hope this evening will be a blessing to you and I invite you to worship with us again as we celebrate Christmas. We will have a festive Christmas Eve service at 10 pm, with a choral and instrumental prelude beginning at 9:30 pm. If you prefer an earlier worship time, Calvary Episcopal Church (821 S 4th St.) will have a service at 4 PM. And you can join us at the Cathedral on Christmas Day for worship at 10:30am.

We pray that Christ's unconditional love comes down to you this holy season and remains with you throughout the year to come.


