### Make a difference at Room in the Inn:

We have completed our first month of Room in the Inn, thanks in large part to your hard work and generosity.



The planning team has continued to incorporate feedback from guests, volunteers, and UP to make for a

smoother experience for everyone involved.

We are still in need of additional volunteers overnight on the evening of February 25 into the morning of February 26. You can make a difference in the lives of our neighbors who would not otherwise have a place to go by being a host on the night listed above.

Here is a brief description of what volunteers will be doing as a part of this ministry. Each night is broken up into three shifts: Welcome, Overnight, and Breakfast.

The Welcome shift (5:00-10:00 PM) will prepare for, welcome, and check-in guests from the guest list provided by UP. Guests arrive at 6 PM. After all the guests arrive, those who have volunteered to provide dinner will share and serve a family-style dinner and conversation with the guests between 6:00 and 7:00 pm, and help with clean-up after the meal. Volunteers to provide dinner are needed. Please sign up to provide a meal for guests and staff on the sign up sheets across from the Office. After dinner is over, guests will have time to watch a movie or television, play a card game, which we'll have available on site, or if they want to, go ahead and turn in for the evening.

The Overnight volunteers will arrive at 9:45 PM, 15 minutes prior to the end of the welcome shift, to allow for check in time between the two teams of volunteers. We require that at least one woman be a part of each overnight shift, as this is a requirement of our insurance provider. Lights will be turned out at 10:00 PM. Overnight volunteers are allowed to sleep in shifts, so no one must be awake for the entire

night. The shift ends at 5:00 AM.

The breakfast shift volunteers arrive at 5:00 AM. Lights are turned on and the two volunteer teams check in about how the overnight shift went. The breakfast shift serves the guests breakfast, and helps them get their belongings together, clean up their spaces, and exit the shelter by 6:30 AM. Once all guests have exited the shelter, breakfast volunteers clean up the shelter space, wash dishes that were used over the course of the evening and morning, and make sure that everything is ready to go the next night. You should be able to wrap up not later than 7:30 AM

We're getting close to filling up our nights, so please take a look at the schedule and see if you might be able to help close out those commitments. If you have any questions about how you can get involved in Room in the Inn, please contact one of the Room in the Inn planning team members

# Parking Next to Cathedral Commons is Changing

The Cathedral has been notified by the owner of the Parking Lot next to Cathedral Commons that beginning the weekend of February 15th, the parking lot next to Cathedral Commons will begin charging a flat fee of \$8.00 to park in the lot on both Saturdays and Sundays. If you wish to park in that lot, there will be designated Public Parking spaces, and signs in each space with a QR code to scan. The QR Code app will have instructions for making payment. Non-paying vehicles will be towed at owners expense for the towing and parking fees.
