We light one candle to remind us of God's light which has come to us all through Christ.








LITURGY OF THE WORD

Gospel Matthew 24:36-44

The Holy Gospel of our Savior, Jesus Christ, according to Matthew. Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to the disciples, "But about that day and hour no one knows, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. For as the days of Noah were, so will be the coming of the Son of Man. For as in those days before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day Noah entered the ark, and they knew nothing until the flood came and swept them all away, so too will be the coming of the Son of Man. Sermon The Very Reverend Matthew Bradley

Nicene Creed • all stand

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.


Have mercy, Lord, for we are sinners in your sight.


